Through the kindness of Rudy Anderson I received a copy of the recent publication of Dr. Leone entitled "A ROENTGENOLOGIC STUDY OF A HUMAN POPULATION EXPOSED TO HIGH-FLUORIDE DOMESTIC WATER" which was a reprint from the American Journal of Roentgenology, Radium Therapy and Nuclear Medicine, Vol. LXXIV, No. 5, November, 1955. This undoubtedly is the paper Dr. Leone referred to in our long distance telephone conversation while I was engaged in the trial of the Martin personal injury case. On Page 876 of this publication Dr. Leone and colleagues state:

"The patient, a female, aged seventy-nine, with a history of fifty-two years' residence in the high fluoride area, died from a massive cerebral vascular accident. A complete autopsy was performed and bone was obtained for histologic examination and chemical analyses."

Evidently the autopsy was only complete to the extent of bone analyses as the paper contained no comment on soft tissue. I was wondering whether or not you had any talks with Dr. Leone regarding this autopsy and whether or not any examination was made of soft tissue.
